Time flies as we approach the spring equinox on the 21st March, the hours of daylight having been lengthening providing us with more time to spend in the garden or on the allotment. March is the time to profit from the winter digging and finally get the ground ready to take plants and seeds once the soil warms a little. Under cover or on a handy windowsill all manner of seeds can be started, advice on sowing is readily available on the back of the seed packet.

Over the winter months there have been some excellent and very informative zoom talks by the National Vegetable/Chrysanthemum Societies. Whilst the chrysanthemum talks were subject based the NVS talks covered a whole raft of talks on vegetables and related subjects. I have been busy rooting around 250 chrysanthemum cuttings since the end of January. All from exhibition stock, either my own or colleagues within the National Chrysanthemum Society. The majority are my exhibition large singles and for the first time some medium singles as an aside. In addition, I have rooted some 70 spray chrysanthemums which I will be giving to members who come along to my talk following the AGM on 3rd April; the catch is that those taking the cuttings will be expected to put vase in our September show.

Potatoes should be chitting well by now, normally they take between four to six weeks but if they haven't started to chit it may well be that the sun has not been strong enough to bring them out of dormancy. For planting the ground temperature should be around 8deg and traditional dates are around 17th March and/or Good Friday 29th March. Onions, shallots and broad beans that have been started in pots can be planted outside.
